

### WE ARE THANKFUL FOR PASTOR LARRY!

Although Pastor Larry went to Wayne State with the intention of becoming a music teacher, it is not surprising that his path turned towards ministry. Both sides of Larry's extended family were deeply rooted in their faith. Larry's parents and maternal grandparents were active members of the First United Methodist Church of Farmington. His father was a Trustee and his mother headed Children's Ministry. His grandfathers joined his parents to make a family quartet that alternated singing between Grandpa Wik's Baptist church and the Farmington Methodist Church. Larry loved to sing along, so his grandmother's would supply him with Certs and Juicy Fruit gum to keep him from singing along from their pew. During high school, Larry sang with the Chancel Choir instead of participating in youth ministry programs. The Farmington pastor was instrumental in suggesting opportunities for Larry to learn about ministry. In high school, Larry had teachers who mentored him in the skills needed for college. His choir director encouraged him to audition for the People to People chorale. This afforded

him the opportunity to travel throughout Asia for six weeks and spend time with youth of many faiths. His English teachers encouraged him to read voraciously and enter an essay contest at Wayne State. A merit scholarship and other awards funded his education at Wayne State.

While at Wayne State, Larry met lifelong friends and toured Europe with the glee club. He and his friend, Mark, stayed in Europe an extra 9 days during which they did a Wesley tour. That experience along with a retreat at the Lake Huron camp for those inquiring into ordained ministry made him look seriously at the option of ministry when he graduated in 1989.

Larry and Jen met in 1991 while singing in the OCC community choir. While working at Cokesbury Publishing, Larry had the opportunity to tour Candler School of Theology. He received a Dean's Scholarship and help from the Farmington Church to make attending Candler a reality. He and Jen maintained their long-distance relationship, saving money by calling after 11:00 PM when long distance phone rates were reduced. They married in 1993 and Jen moved to Atlanta for Larry's final semester. Larry's first placement was at Ford Memorial United Methodist Church in Detroit in 1994. He followed Rev. Faith Fowler in that placement. In 1998, he followed our own Pastor Marge, taking over at Canton Cherry Hill. The Wik's became a family of five while in Canton, with the addition of Sarah (James and Aaron

had been born in Detroit).

LOUMC was fortunate to have Larry become the Senior Pastor in 2012. During that year, Larry lost his father. The congregations of Manchester and LOUMC supported him throughout this difficult time.

In his spare time, Larry loves to watch Detroit sports. He is a fan of all of the teams, but particularly enjoys the Pistons. Hopefully, this year will bring lots to cheer about for our teams! Larry also continues to pursue his love of music. He has been singing at Temple Bethel for High Holy Days since 1998. He and Jen sing together in the Troy Community Chorus and the Dearborn

Summer Chorus.

Pastor Larry has graced our church with his musical talent, knowledge, patience, hard work ethic and kindness throughout the past eleven years. We are truly blessed.



And the Word became flesh and lived among us.

And we have seen his glory, the glory as of the Father's only Son, full of grace and truth. (John 1:14)

This scripture from the Gospel of John describes for us what we call the Incarnation – the Word of God becoming, in Jesus, flesh and blood. Holy Communion is a further step in this process of Incarnation, for once the historical "in the flesh" Jesus is no longer with us, his presence remains available to us in the elements of the bread and the cup. (Which is why we will have Communion throughout the Advent season.)

And we the Church are to be an integral part of the Incarnation as well, becoming for the world the "Body of Christ."

I read recently about a young child who, when she tried to say the word "disciples," ended up saying "de-Bibles." How appropriate! For we who are disciples may be de-Bibles (the only Bibles) that people experience. We are to embody Christ the Word—a profound responsibility, for sure.

The temporal, brick and mortar, "keep the lights on, and pay the staff" needs of the Church are far from glamorous. Nor are they particularly inspiring. But it is in meeting these institutional necessities that we give flesh and bone to the lifeblood of the Church's ministry and that we further the mission of God. So, we would be remiss not to ask, in this season of Incarnation, for your continued generosity as a congregation in giving financially toward the ministries here at LOUMC.

Please, as you are able, give generously this Christmas – and throughout the coming New Year – with glad and grateful hearts.




